






# Celebrating Community and Culture



### **Opening Doors to Life-Changing Careers**

### BRFN Indigenous Youth Attend Nationwide Gathering

Tourmaline supports Indspire's Soaring event, held annually to help high school students learn more about careers and postsecondary educational options. This year's event was held in Vancouver in April where Tourmaline sponsored four Blueberry River First Nations youth to join over 1,500 other Indigenous youth from across Canada. Over two days, participants engaged in immersive academic and career workshops, watched inspiring panels featuring young Indigenous leaders, and met some of Canada's top employers. Tourmaline hosted student workshops for aspiring students to learn, broadening their knowledge of education and career paths and job opportunities. Next year's gathering will be held in Halifax May 12-13, 2026.









## **Empower Your Future With the Tourmaline Indigenous Student Bursaries**

Tourmaline bursaries are offered through Indspire, providing financial support to Indigenous students across British Columbia and Alberta.

The Indspire program aims to educate, connect, and invest in skill development and provide opportunities for building brighter futures in our communities.

Tourmaline joined Indspire back in 2021 and donated \$300,000 over three years

to support Indigenous students. Did you know that every dollar is matched by the Canadian government? This helps fund even more students! The success of previous bursary recipients has "indspired" us to continue our partnership for an additional three years of funding, valued at \$300,000.

 Ongoing conversations with trapline holders and members to help us understand concerns and explore opportunities together.




# Celebrating Indigenous Achievements

Tourmaline invited previous Tourmaline Indigenous Student Bursary recipients to attend the awards gala. Award recipients provide inspiration for young people and help educate all Canadians about the tremendous contributions that Indigenous peoples are making across the country.





## **Ensuring Our Sites Are Kept Safe, While Respecting the Land on Which We Operate**

Tourmaline takes pride in operating to the highest standards - protecting the safety of people, the environment, and the land on which we work. A key part of that commitment is our ongoing, consistent monitoring program with BRFN on Tourmaline work sites. Monitoring work sites allows community members to carefully observe, share knowledge, and protect Treaty Rights. Monitors help us with our operations, minimizing our environmental impacts to land, air and water. To date, this has resulted in 15,600 hours — equivalent to roughly 1,950 working days — of BRFN monitoring to ensure our sites are kept safe. Each monitor completes orientation with Tourmaline to help ensure members

understand our sites, processes, and safety protocols.

These monitoring efforts include:

- Wildlife and habitat monitoring to respect and preserve local biodiversity.
- Identify opportunities for improvement, ensuring Treaty Rights are protected.

Monitors can share ideas with Tourmaline, helping meet community goals and cultivating an Indigenous-led system. Elders can work with certified monitors, fostering cultural exchange, knowledge sharing and promoting environmental stewardship rooted in tradition and expertise.



## Restoring the Land Together

Reclamation is a vital part of Tourmaline's commitment to responsible resource development. We are proud to collaborate with Blueberry River First Nations' Grandmother's Greenhouse, an initiative that grows and preserves culturally significant native plants and seeds. These seeds and seedlings will be used in our reclamation efforts, helping return the land, as closely as possible, to its original state. By incorporating plants native to the territory, we honour traditional knowledge, uphold environmental stewardship, and reflect the values of the community.





Blueberry River First Nations (BRFN) and Tourmaline (TOU) are working together to forge a path to sustainable development that respects Treaty Rights and builds strong communities. With Canada's largest natural gas producer on your side, the community benefits are considerable.

Tourmaline recognizes the importance of building and maintaining positive relationships with Indigenous Peoples, especially within our operational footprint.
